





Let's help IWEF have sustaining scholarships to last beyond our years!




### 2021 LEGISLATIVE ISSUES

### From Judy Zell, PSP, legislation chair:

This is not an election year, so this fall is a good time for you to get to know your candidates, especially the ones for the state legislature. Invite them to speak at your local BPW meeting, or invite them to a barbecue or similar neighborhood function. The legislature is the body which will be doing the re-districting or gerrymandering for the next 5 Congressional elections after this year's census results. Nearly one-half of our counties have lost population; and the doughnut counties, Boone, Hamilton, Hancock, and Hendricks, have been the biggest gainers. Try to attend one of the meetings which are being held around the state to learn more and express your views about re-districting.

Voters' rights, Covid-19, and the power of government officials have been the big issues so far this year at both the state and national levels. Our political parties are still terribly divided. Congress has finally agreed on a big infrastructure bill, which includes broadband internet access as well as roads and bridges. I am pleased that my new Congresswoman, Victoria Spartz, has introduced a bill which would make accounting one of the STEM subjects, because it involves similar mathematical and analytical skills.

Whatever your favorite political issues are, please contact your elected representatives and let them know your views. Every woman counts!



### Marie J.B. Martin, PSP



Bette graduated from St. Vincent's Elementary School and then proceeded to graduate from Waldron High School. She was a free-lance writer and photographer for 12 years, and editor of Hoosier Business Woman, quarterly of the Indiana Federation of Business & Professional Women's Clubs from 1975-1990. Bette wrote a history of the St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church (Shelby County) in 1982. She created a monthly publication, in "Pathways", at St. Vincent for over 20 years. Bette was a of several organizations, including being a Lifetime member of St. Vincent's Catholic Church; Secular Oblate of Saint Benedict of Saint Meinrad Archabbey, in St. Meinrad, IN; St. Ann's Altar Society of St. Vincent's; former member of the Shelbyville Business and Professional Women's Club; and Member of the First Archdiocesan Pastoral Council of the Archdiocese of Indianapolis.

She had a passion to serve in various ministries at St. Vincent's Catholic Church; she was Eucharistic Minister for over 25 years. Bette was a Die- Hard Chicago Cubs fan since 1938 and a fan of I.U. basketball. She enjoyed writing, reading, and kept high school basketball scrapbooks, specifically of Waldron High School games. The scrapbook kept records and personal write-ups of hers from the early '40s to 1970.

Bette is survived by several nephews, nieces, cousins, and many friends. She was preceded in death by her parents, two sisters, and eight brothers.

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







